Henry Louis Gates, Jr. to Be Keynote Speaker at 2008 Conference

ark you calendars! You don't want to miss this event! Preeminent historian Henry Louis Gates, Jr. has accepted the invitation to be the keynote speaker at BBAAGHS' Awards Banquet on Friday, February 15, 2008. The 2nd Annual Black Belt Genealogy Conference and Family History Fair will be held February 14-17, 2008 in Selma, AL.

Henry Louis Gates, Jr., is the W. E. B. Du Bois Professor of the Humanities and the Director of the W. E. B. Du Bois Institute for African and African American Research at Harvard University. Among his numerous accomplishments, Dr. Gates wrote and produced the PBS documentary "African American Lives," (2006) the first documentary series to employ genealogy and science to provide an understanding of African American history, and

"Oprah's Roots" (2007). He also wrote and produced the documentaries "Wonders of the African World" (2000) and "America Beyond the Color Line" (2004) for the BBC and PBS, and authored the companion volumes to both series. Dr. Gates is currently at work on a sequel to "African American Lives." (scheduled to air in February 2008 — ed.)



uthor and BBAAGHS Treasurer Donald P. Stone gave a lecture on his book, *Fallen Prince*, on August 16th at ArchiTreats, the Alabama Department of Archives monthly lecture series.

Fallen Prince: William James Edwards, Black Education and the Quest for Afro American Nationality is Stone's biography of his maternal grandfather, William James Edwards, heroic rise from abject

poverty to found Snow Hill Institute in 1893 for the education of former slaves and their children. *Fallen Prince*

arcs across six generations and treats the question of American bondage, the struggle for African American education, and the story of the life and accomplishments of William James Edwards. A narrative geneology by Edwards that traces his lineage back to the aarly 1700s forms the appendix.

Donald is a writer and social and political activist. He was educated at Snow Hill Institute and Morehouse College. He was a member of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), the Black Workers' Congress, and the African Liberation Support Committee. He resides in Wilcox County on the grounds of the Snow Hill Institute and is active in

BBAAGHS Receives Black Belt Community Foundation Grant

lack Belt African American Genealogical and Historical Society was awarded a \$750.00 grant from the Black Belt Community Foundation that will allow BBAAGHS to apply for 501(c)(3) taxexempt status. The award was made at a Grants Award Ceremony on Saturday, September 8, 2007 at the Central Alabama Farmers Co-op in Selma. President B.J. Smothers, Vice President Millie Lee Dulaney, Secretary Jo Ann Smith and Parliamentarian Jabrina Howard attended.

The Black Belt Community Foundation, which is beginning its fourth year of operation, was established to support community efforts in the Black Belt that will contribute to the strength, innovation, and success of all the region's people and communities. The foundation's mission is to forge a collective stream of giving fro the community and other sources so we, the people of the Black Belt, can enhance our continuing efforts to lift ourselves by "taking what we have to make what we need."

Grants are awarded twice yearly. Since the first round in March 2005, the Black Belt Community Foundation has awarded grants to over 200 organizations for over \$450,000. BBAAGHS was part of a group of 38 organizations from across the Black Belt receiving \$62, 500.00 in funds from the sixth round of grants from BBCF.
